Dr. Ernesto Zedillo is a Mexican economist and politician who served as President of Mexico from 1994 to 2000. He successfully faced one of the most acute financial crises in the modern history of Mexico, which favoured a political opening and competitive elections.

Ernesto Zedillo was a Distinguished Visiting Fellow at the London School of Economics. He is also Director of the Center for Globalization Studies and Professor of International Economics and Politics at Yale University since 2002. Currently, Ernesto Zedillo is a member of the G30 and the Board of Directors of the Peterson Institute for International Economics. He is a Distinguished Practitioner of the Blavatnik School of Government at Oxford and in 2011 he was elected an international member of the American Philosophical Society. He holds honorary degrees from Yale and Harvard Universities; the University of Ghana; the Hebrew University of Jerusalem; the University of Massachusetts, Amherst; and the University of Miami.
